Big Brothers Big Sisters Seeks Adult Role Models

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Windham County is both applauding the nearly two hundred adult and high school students who have mentored children during the past school year, while encouraging others to join their ranks as mentors this summer.

At present, thirty youngsters are eagerly waiting to be matched with an adult mentor in Windham County and nearby New Hampshire. According to Jessi Krause, the program's director, there is a particular need for Big Brothers right now, with the program only serving one boy to every three girls. "Local boys often remain on the waiting list for two, sometimes three years to be matched due to the shortage of male volunteers," Krause said. "Girls may still wait for Big Sisters, but they have a much higher probability of being served than the boys."

National research shows that "mentoring" pairing a caring adult volunteer with a young person for a mutually rewarding friendship - is an effective method of addressing all sorts of youth-related issues, from combating drug and alcohol use and violence, to getting along better with their families and peers. Hard data indicates adult attention is a major factor in youth success, with Little Brothers and Little Sisters 46% less likely to begin using illegal drugs, 27% less likely to begin using alcohol, 52% less likely to skip school, and more confident about their academic performance in school.

According to Krause, Big Brothers and

Sisters spend time on a regular basis with their "Littles", enjoying life's simple pleasures such as playing catch, baking cookies, taking walks, or simply talking together. "Being a "Big" is not about becoming a surrogate parent and it's not about "taking on a problem kid" or tying up lots of your time," she explained. "You only make the time commitment that works for you. For some, becoming a Big may be just what YOU need to schedule time for a little fun in vour own life."

"Mentors show that a single soul can make a difference in a young person's life," Krause said. "We want to recognize the many individuals in our program who dedicate their time, talents, and energy to help children develop character and integrity through serving as a "Big" while encouraging others to join their ranks."
