Brattleboro Union High School Wins Prestigious Marjot Foundation Science Award

Marta McBean, a high school student from Dummerston, Vermont is one of this year's winners of the prestigious Marjot Foundation Award for Environmental Research. Ms. McBean will use the \$3,000 grant to study the impact of climate change on sugar maple sap production in the southeastern Vermont towns of Dummerston, Putney and Brattleboro.

"It is a very well thought out study with the potential to increase our understanding of climate change on Vermont sugar maple populations," said Michael Auerbach, a teacher in the science department at Brattleboro Union High School, who will be her mentor for the study.

"I first plan to examine root starch content, soil chemistry, and physical tree measurements such as trunk diameters, and will then compare the data with historical data at the UVM Maple Research Center," said Ms. McBean.

Ms. McBean joins a very talented group of southern Vermont students who also have received Marjot Foundation grants. In 2006, a team from Brattleboro Union High School examined the effects of land use on the health of the Williams and West Rivers. The team went on to win a silver medal of excellence at the Vermont Science Fair as well as a first place designation by the Green Mountain Water Environment Association.
